Deciduous

Red Oak – (2-0) 12-28” seedlings. Fast growth to 75’. Will grow in wet areas, best in rich soils in full sun. Will tolerate urban conditions. Very valuable timber tree.

White Oak – (2-0) 10-20” seedlings, can grow to 90’. Will grow in wet areas, best in rich loamy soils, full sun. Resistant to ice breakage and oak wilt.

Black Cherry – (2-0) 20-30” seedlings, can grow to 70’, extremely valuable timber tree, also good for wildlife. Does best in rich, moist, soils.

Sugar Maple – (2-0) 8-18” seedlings can grow to 75’. Does not do well in wet areas. Native to the area, provide products from sap in the spring.

Black Walnut – (2-0) 20-30” seedlings, grows to 100’, grows best in deep, rich, moist soils. Highly valued hardwood for cabinets and furniture. Produces large, flavorful nuts.

Evergreens

Norway Spruce – (3-0) 10-24” seedlings, can grow to 150’, 6’ in 6-7 years. Good for Christmas trees, timber and windbreaks. Thrives in ordinary soils: needs good moisture to keep green color. Space 6’ apart.

Colorado Blue Spruce – (3-0) 7-14” seedlings, can grow to 100’ and should reach 6’ in 8-9 years. Silvery blue needles. Likes most soils and average sun. Does not like wet soils. Great for Christmas trees.

Frasier Fir – (3-0) 5-10” seedlings, can grow to 60’. Likes well drained soils, does not require full sun. The “Cadillac of Christmas Trees”. Very soft, shiny, dark green needles.

American Red Pine – (2-0) 3-6” seedlings, can grow to 75’. Ordinary to poor soils, can withstand dry, windy, rocky conditions. Good for naturalizing and as a wind break.

Semi-Dwarf Trees

Two year tree pruned to a 5/8” to 3/4” branch, 4’-6’ high. Most require two different varieties for proper pollination.

Apples

Cardinal Cortland – Heavy-bearing, ruby red, very crispy, great in toss salads. Great for pies and cider. Ripens in mid-september.

Macoun – High quality all purpose apple. Medium fruit, dark red over green background. Ripens late September, holds well in chilled storage.

Granny Smith – Green heavy bearing. Tart flavor really lasts, and stays fresh all winter and spring, good all purpose apple. Ripen late October

Plums

Shiro - 3/4” branch, 5’ – 6’ high. Yellow, round, prolific fruit. Hardy. Needs another variety for pollination. Ripens Mid August.

Santa Rosa – 3/4” branch, 5’-6’ high. reddish-purple skin, juicy, sweet, yellow flesh with a mild flavor. Self-fertile so no pollinator is needed. It is drought-tolerant and is a regular bearer. Ripens mid to late August.

Number of 2 Year Fertilizer Tablets per Size Plant

1 Tablet - All seedlings, transplants

2 Tablets – Container grown plants, roses

1 Tablet – For each 1/2 inch trunk diameter, large trees & evergreens

Tablets are 10 grams each, 20% Nitrogen, 10% Phosphoric Acid, 5% Potash. TABLETS SHOULD NOT TOUCH ROOTS.

Blueberry Bushes

Thrive almost anywhere in acid soil; in alkaline soils add aluminum sulfate. Plant two different varieties for best results. Like full sun. 2-3 year, 12” – 18”

Blueray – Recommended for the northeast. Highly flavored fruit. Very productive bushes, free from disease. Ripens early to mid July.

Duke - Known for extremely large fruit, ripens mid-July.

Grapes, Seedless

2 yr #1 stock, 10” – 16”, Vines need 8 feet of growing space, no pollinators needed, very few pests, minimal maintenance.

Canadice, red – Firm fully ripe red, no tough skins. Ripen late August early September. Tolerates sub-zero temperatures. Very good for fresh use.

Lakemont, white – Hardy, great for juice and fresh eating. Same grapes as you see in the supermarket.

Concord, blue – Tops for jams, juice and wine. Slightly smaller fruit ripens mid September.

Wildlife Enhancement

Sawtooth Oak – (2-0) 10-20” seedlings. Fast growth to 70’. Tolerates most soils. Space 20’ apart for best acorn production. Should produce within 7-10 years. Excellent for WILDLIFE.

American Cranberry – (2-0) 5-15” seedlings. A shrub that can grow to 12 ft. Red berries provide food for birds, excellent wetland species.

American Mountain Ash – 2 yr. 12-24” seedling. Tree can grow to 30 ft. Small clusters of white flowers followed by orange berries. Brilliant fall color. Great for winter birds.

Sweet Crabapple – 1yr 3-6” seedlings. Short trunk with a wide spreading canopy to 30ft height. Use as a pollinator to other apples. Fruit is bitter until frozen. Flowers favored by Honey Bee.

Elderberry – Root Stock. A fast growing shrub, grown for its clusters of bluish-black berries, which appear in late summer. Great for jams and for wildlife.

Standard Winter Banana Apple – 5/8” to 3/4” branch, 4-6’ high. Late season. An excellent pollinator, the fruit are large, pale yellow, with a rose blush. The flesh is crisp, juicy, coarse, and aromatic, with a good sugar: acid balance. It is an heirloom variety
